






Recipe wishlist

Tuesday - How To Make Fruit Pizzas

Ingredients:

- Natural yoghurt
- 3 4 different types of fruit e.g. apple, banana, grapes, orange

Equipment

- Plate
- Spreading knife
- Sharp knife


Top Tip:

Keep the fruit pizzas in the fridge once made.

What to do:

- 4 Digestive biscuits 1. Place 4 biscuits on the plate.
 - 2. Evenly spread the yoghurt onto each biscuit.
 - 3. Cautiously cut up the fruit into small pieces. (Ask a grown up to help you when using the sharp knife.)
 - 4. Put the fruit on top of the yoghurt.

Features of Instructions

- 1. They are written in the present tense.
- 2. Bossy verbs and adverbs are at the beginning of each step.
- 3. Numbers are used to sequence the steps/instructions.
- 4. Topic words are used.
- 5. Create clear and concise simple sentences.






Wednesday - Drawing activities

- First, label the page Sandwich ingredients and draw all the ingredients you need.
 Ingredients are the food items.
- Next, label the page Sandwich Equipment and draw all of the equipment you need. This includes knife, plate etc – all of the non-food items
- Finally, label the page Sandwich Method and draw your instructions step by step. You can label each step if you like.



Procedural Writing

Week One

Procedural writing is used to explain how something is done, in a series of sequenced steps, which are organised by goal, material, method and evaluation. Common features of procedural writing include: imperative or 'bossy' verbs (put, stir, place, peel, etc.) linking words to do with time (then, next, etc.) and detailed factual descriptions. Tense is timeless in procedural writing.
